

Expanded Distribution

Since 2016, Coastal Roots Farm has partnered with Helping Hand Worldwide to feed active-duty military and veteran families living at or below the poverty line. For the last few months, additional (non-military) individuals who live nearby began attending this distribution, hoping to receive extra produce. Some have waited for hours. In response to this need, the Farm team has increased its allocation of food in order to additionally reach these community members in need.

Production Internship

Quarter 1 marked the end of another successful production internship with 3 interns who supported seeding, transplanting, harvesting, coop moves, and egg washing, contributing more than 100 total hours!



Didyou know?

Compost requires nitrogen, carbon, water, and air. Nitrogen is often green or wet material, while carbon is often brown or dry. This Quarter, Coastal Roots Farm changed its compost recipe: in the past, our main nitrogen source was donated lettuce, and now we are using horse manure. We will continue to make our own soil as part of our "closed-loop" system.

An Intergenerational Chanukah



In Quarter 1, Coastal Roots Farm hosted its largest-ever Thanksgiving Farm Camp with 36 campers in attendance including 5 on scholarship! Our team remains committed not only to providing equitable access to quality outdoor environmental education but also filling childcare gaps during school breaks for local families.





Quarter 1 of this year represents a 203% increase in Nature Play attendance compared to FY22 Q1 and a 109% increase in attendance compared to FY23 Q1.
